Reports of Society Meetings:

5 March 2013 - Sir Winston S Churchill - Mr N Evans

Mr Evans made a welcome return to Redhill to give a display relating to arguably one of the greatest Prime Ministers to have held office. The display took its historic prompts from a series of trade cards that depict the life of Churchill, around which was displayed relevant stamp issues to expand on the picture shown on each card.

The display followed Winston's life starting from his birth on 30 November 1974 at Blenheim Palace in Oxfordshire, through his early life and education at Harrow where he developed his love of the subjects of English and History, and became the school fencing champion. The story then moved on to his early adult years with the 4th Hussars in India and on to his experiences in South Africa, the Boar War and as a reporter on the conflict.

In 1900 Churchill won a seat for the Conservatives in the House of Commons (representing Oldham). He was later famously to move to the Liberal party under the Campbell-Bannerman and Asquith administrations where he held several Cabinet positions including First Lord of the Admiralty (where he supported the development of Tanks and the re-armament of the navy) and Home Secretary. In the wake of the disastrous Dardanelles campaign in World War 1 Churchill lost his cabinet position and for a time served on the Western Front, before returning to office as Minister for Munitions.

After the War Winston re-joined the Conservative party and became Chancellor of the Exchequer in Baldwin's government, taking Britain back to the Gold Standard in 1924, at an exchange rate that resulted in harsh financial difficulties for many. From 1929 Churchill entered a period often referred to as the "Wilderness Years". During this time he spoke out on the threat of Communism and later Fascism, but did not hold office in government. This state of affairs changed in the prelude to the Second World War when Churchill returned to the Admiralty before taking over from Chamberlain as Prime Minister. The War years were again illustrated by Mr Evans including reference to the speeches and the lows and highs as the war progressed.

The story did not end with the War as having lost the general election in 1945 the Conservatives under Churchill returned to power in 1951, and had to face problems in Kenya and Malaya. With failing health, Churchill resigned in 1955 and spent the majority of his retirement at his homes: Chartwell in Kent and at Hyde Park Gate in London.

On 15 January 1965, Churchill suffered a severe stroke that left him gravely ill. He died at his London home nine days later, at age 90, on the morning of Sunday 24 January 1965, 70 years to the day after his father's death.

Mr Evans display covered Winston Churchill's political and military careers, his interests in horse racing, and painting, as well as awards bestowed on him and how he has been commemorated. The use of the set of trade cards as a strand in drawing together the story proved interesting and effective.

(For those wishing to expand their knowledge there is a collection of Sir Winston Churchill memorabilia on display at Bletchley Park (Station X in WWII), and a little closer to Redhill - Churchill's home Chartwell, now in the care of the National Trust, is open to visitors)

Royal Mail - Dr Who Commemorative Stamp issue: 26 March 2013 PHQ Cards

In a the April 2013 Newsletter (Vol.16 No. 2) mention was made that *Coin and Stamp Mart* magazine was giving away a set of Dr Who PHQ cards with their May 2013 issue. Both the giveaway cards and those sold by the Post Office show the issued stamps on the picture side, however there are subtle differences on the reverse, more particularly the wording on the right hand "address" side of the divided back, creating two collectable sets. The London 2012 Olympics

In the last couple of months there have been several articles in the philatelic press and in Picture Postcard Monthly marking the first anniversary of the games and drawing together information concerning stamps and postcards issued to mark The 30th Olympiad. A short article appeared in the Newsletter (Vol. 15 No. 4, October 2012) concerning the effect of the Games on Redhill Post Office. However there were other short term effects on the provision of services by Royal Mail other than the Sunday opening described in October's Newsletter. While these are difficult to illustrate in terms of stamps and postal history on an album page, they do form part of the story of the Olympics and as such should be recorded.

The effect of an Olympic Games is not only confined to the venues. The numbers of visitors to events, the need to move competitors, judges and dignitaries quickly between sites and the staging of competitions such as the marathon through the streets of a city all had the potential to disrupt the day to day operation of the Post. This was recognised in the planning stages before the Games by Royal Mail and the decision was taken to bring forward some collection and delivery times. In some circumstances pillar boxes were taken out of use for the duration of the Olympics.

Collections from this box during the Games Period (23 July to 9 Sept.) will be earlier than usual to allow collected mail to meet onward connections.
